

et-Tern Marine ("JTM") established its first factory in Dongguan, China in 1998. A second larger factory later opened in Zhuhai, China in 2003. As JTM began from scratch, our team worked hard from the first day to grow and to endure under a multitude of market conditions. Through it all, we have always kept in mind our core value of "pursuing perfection in presenting ourselves to the world".

Selene was the ancient Greek goddess of the moon and represented good fortune and balance. As the moon was a key aid for naval navigation, this name was apt for representing skilled and smooth boating. So we chose Selene to be our brand and have remained dedicated from the beginning to build Selene into a world class yacht brand.

The Selene 43 Long Range Trawler was our first version of the Selene design. She was created in collaboration with Australian naval architect Harvey Halvorsen, with a classic profile and interior trawler features. She and the Selene 47 and 49 have all been very successful boats. Later, JTM developed one of the most successful trawlers in the yacht industry with the Selene 53 / 54 / 55/ 56 series of yachts. The excellent stateroom, extraordinary layout and graceful style made this series one of the most popular trawler yacht series ever. JTM has built 110 of these Selenes, which is a rare feat for any model series in the yacht industry.

We continued with the development of the beautiful Selene 62/66 series with the British designer Ken Freivokh, taking into account substantial feedback from numerous dealers and owners. These models provide a tremendous value relative to cost, especially with their configuration that includes a spacious stateroom and functional crew cabins. Additionally, we developed the popular Selene 60 model, with a variety of special features among which is a utility room located between the engine room and master stateroom.

Currently, JTM has created a large yacht series dubbed the Selene Explorer series. We are working with world renowned Dutch yacht designer Guido de Groot, and have created designs of 78', 92', 103', 115' and up to 128'. The design, material, equipment, and craftsmanship are all world class.

As always, we very much appreciate the owners who choose JTM and Selene; allowing us the opportunity to build your dream boat. The achievements of our owners and their enthusiasm for Selene is our greatest pride. It is also what drives us to improve. Last, but not least, the valuable advice from our many owners is what has enabled JTM to improve and develop the Selene brand. Business is but for a moment, while friendship is for life. JTM will endeavor to keep upgrading and growing with the larger Selene family. Your dream is our commitment.



f you ask us (Chris and Susan Carlin, the owners of the 36' Selene Gypsy Spirit) what inspired us to buy a boat, our responses would be fishing and cruising respectively. In 2002, after having our Blackman 26' Billfisher built in San Diego, Chris put it to use fishing with the kids on local kelp paddies and islands, along with a few 200+ mile long weekend runs to Mexico for tuna. Susan initially used the boat as a kayaking base, a quiet refuge to work, and a meeting place for friends. But when Chris' fishing partners flew the coop, we switched priorities to cruising. Over time, when the long weekends in Two Harbors, Catalina stretched to a week and then longer, we realized that acquiring a bigger boat was in order. We were looking for the smallest big boat we could afford and manage, both on the seas and in the limited marina spaces in Southern California. So we were drawn to trawlers with aft cabins, 2 heads, lots of open deck space, and minimal stairs. After reading countless articles and blogs on cruising, this narrowed our choice to a Selene 36/38 and we found one in late 2013. Although it might take longer to get there, the trips are much more comfortable, and we're fully rested on arrival and ready to enjoy the good life. 2014 was our shake-down year, taking numerous week to month-long trips, braving post-hurricane swells, and trying our hands at anchoring. As retired boaters in 2015, we took multiple month long cruises, with a mix of marina hopping (Dana Point to Santa Barbara) and time anchored at various Channel Islands. In early 2016, we've spent a few months in Ensenada, Mexico waiting for boat transport to the Pacific Northwest. With 300+ hours under our belts we're hoping to learn more and prepare for a flotilla trip to Alaska in 2017. Since our favorite experiences on Gypsy Spirit have come from kayaking, hiking/exploring the areas she takes us to, and meeting a diverse group of people, we are eagerly looking forward to many new journeys.

Jean-Yves & Marie-Roselyne Bouvier owners of Nomades



Dear unknown friend, we trust that you are happy owners of a 'Selene ' as we are. Everything starts from first principles, so we have this in common: We are 'Seleners'! Sorry for this anglicism, but, in my opinion, it reflects the passion that we carry for our "water mobile homes". Let me introduce ourselves. We are three "Nomades": Roselyne, my wife, "Nomades" our Selene 6039, and myself, Jean-Yves. We are French and we live in Noumea - New Caledonia, in the heart of the Coral Sea: longitude 166 ° 26' S - latitude 22 ° 16' S (Tropic of Capricorn). Five years ago, I decided to stop my professional activities and take time just for ourselves (lucky to be able to make that choice). Still, we needed to know what to do! As sea and boat lovers, owners of a DeFever 57' Trawler, in Noumea we had toured regularly the turquoise waters of the Caledonian lagoon. Its beautiful, its often magical, its unique, and with few visitors with moorings you can scarcely imagine its wonder. But it is immensely empty as well. Nomades is my 11th boat. I started boating at age of 12 on a small sailing centerboat. Later, I discovered "trawlers" in 1979 with a Cheoy Lee 36.

In October 2010 we decided that the Mediterranean would be our future land of discoveries and agreed that it would be the ideal place to go to the discovery of our roots. April 2011: I gave the business keys to my partner. Twenty hours later, we were at Roissy Airport, then onwards to Golfe Juan on the French Riviera to meet our Selene dealer and to choose our future floating home. Our choice was a Selene 60. This was a nice size to stay aboard for 7 months a year, manageable by two and allowed us to have aboard, from time to time, family and friends who wished to share our itinerant lifestyle. In August 2011 we welcomed our 6039 SELENE in San Remo—Italy and named her Nomades. Heading to Tunisia for our maiden cruise, we completed a journey of 1000 Miles to Tunisia, from San Remo - Sidi Bou Said – San Remo - not bad for a first cruise in the Mediterranean. It was an excellent test, which allowed us to feel the boat and our own capabilities. Then, we prepared Nomades for the winter season and were back to Nouméa in mid-November. Nomads are often migratory and moving away from northern winters is part of our program.

April-October 2012: we went from San Remo to Marrina di Ragusa, on the southern coast of Sicily; a journey of 1800 miles with increments from 40 to 100 miles, leading us to Porto Venere, Elbe, two months in Corsica, Sardinia, Rome, the Gulf of Naples, Aeolian and Sicily: Palermo, West Egadi Islands, and finally Marina di Ragusa, where we left Nomades for wintering. This first full cruising year was a succession of discoveries and encounters with history and people. Corsica and New Caledonia are so similar, both in landscape beauty and in their inhabitants' insular mentality. Everywhere, the old stones have stories to tell. And what about Sicily! It was the first Greek colony, subject to a famous invasion in classical history and was at the crossroads of all the Mediterranean sea routes. With the privilege of time, we could choose to stay or to leave, to be curious about everything, to discover locals and share their way of life, and to wait for a good weather window to navigate under the best conditions.

Another the summer peak season, when Italians, Germans, Austrian all descend in search of sun, warmth and crystalline water. Everywhere, on the Adriatic coast, ports are well organized, with burnished, effective and often smiling administrators. Entry into Europe ought to rapidly be made subject to less stringent formalities. In July, at Punat Marina, we participated in the first Rendezvous organized by the European Selene dealers and more particularly by Ales Strmljan, representative to the Adriatic. Six Selenes were there. It was a cosmopolitan and festive atmosphere as we exchanged experiences and solutions, anecdotes of moorings, etc. Some workshops had been prepared by the marina and the dealers, with the assistance of professionals in many fields concerning boating, cruising and security. Howard Chen was also here, happy to meet satisfied owners. He listened to all remarks and recommendations and was anxious to take them into account for future models.

For the 2014 cruising season we decide to stay in the Adriatic, cruising Croatia and Italy one more time. We also participated at the 2nd Mediterranean Selene Rendevous! Some American owners also attended. Dave and Ginny Morthland were invited by Radoje and Alenka Micic, Selene 54 "Kitri's Slovenian owners, and joined the "parade". This event was the peak experience of our 2014 cruise. In October, we left Nomades in Punat Marina for the winter and then flew back home. After a few months we were back to the Adriatic to start a new season. For 4 months, Kitri and Nomades cruised together from Punat to Dubrovnik, Montenegro, and several Ionian Islands in Greece (Corfu, Paxos, and Ithaka). Unfortunately, we had to stop this cruise earlier than we intended and then went back to Punat by mid August to leave NOMADES. On 2016, March 7th, we left Noumea to France and started our 2016 Cruise around mid-April. We will cruise from Punat Marina-Croatia one more time. This year we have no program-only cruising around the Adriatic. We hope to stay aboard 6 months. We have so many more discoveries to discover! Probably some friends will join us from time to time. The Adriatic is a real fantastic place for boating! The playing field is huge and rich in discoveries: fairground moorings to profusion, small ports and coves nestled at the bottom of calangues (well sheltered and often with small restaurants that will welcome you). Even at the height of the season, we've never really encountered problems of anchorage, whether it's finding a place to dock in a port or a marina or whether it's a fairground mooring anchor. Nautical guides: "IMRAY-Adriatic" gives all information about ports, moorings and formalities. So, will we have the pleasure to meet you this year and to receive you on our board for a small dinner or an aperitif? If so, there will be questions of travel, history and stories of our Selene and maybe our future Selene? I remain at your disposal for more information if you wish. See you soon? e are John and Jane Wright of Golden, Colorado. Our boat, Phantom, is Selene hull 4327 and she was delivered in April, 2007. She is now moored at Cap Sante Marina in Anacortes, Washington. We started sailing together in 1977 with a charter in the Bahamas. After several years of chartering sailboats we experienced the San Juan Islands in 1988 and discovered the joys of powerboating in the Pacific Northwest (PNW). For almost 20 years we chartered from Anacortes Yacht Charters, usually during the week Thanksgiving (U.S.), but also in the summer. The chartering led to the observation that everyone in the PNW has a powerboat-some of them have sails furled on the boom with their skippers standing in the rain, and in some of them the skipper is in shirtsleeves sitting in a pilot house sipping tea while the mates drink wine, read books, and gaze out the windows. The last boat we chartered from AYC was a new and unknown manufacturer-Jet Tern. We were really impressed with the design and craftsmanship of Dragontail, a Selene 36. After a few days on board we wondered who sold these boats and how much they were. We were surprised and delighted to find that the "dealer" was Friday Harbor Yacht sales. We stopped in, got some information, and continued our charter. As we had a chance to look at the boat, we found several clever design features. We had chartered around 15 other powerboats over the years and we liked the Selene the best of all of them. Near the end of the charter, we took the plunge and ordered a 40. The waitlist was 18 months at the time, so we had time to look at other models. We then fell in love with the 43 and ordered one. As a result, we were boatless with two Selenes on order. In the end, we were able to sell the 40 and take delivery on the 43. Since 2007, we have put about 1500 hours on Phantom; some years we have been able to spend quite a bit of time onboard and some years the curse of the boating class, work, took precedence. We are still tethered to cell phones and internet because of business so our cruising has all been in Puget Sound and the inside of Vancouver Island. We have had many great experiences, but one that stands out more than any other occurred during a trip to Princess Louisa and Chatterbox falls. We were headed from Pender Harbour to the falls when we saw a young humpback whale and stopped to have a look. The whale came swimming up to the boat with a tree limb in its mouth and proceeded to play with it like a puppy with a stick. He would roll the limb over his flukes and then take it in his mouth and dive under the boat. On several occasions he swam under the boat and blew bubbles to "tickle" us. This went on for over half an hour and would have continued longer, but we finally had to leave to make the slack at Malibu Falls. It was truly a magical experience. We continue to cruise the South Sound, San Juans, and the Gulf islands and look forward to getting to "cut the cord" and circumnavigate Vancouver Island or spending a month in the Broughtons.



Since leaving the PNW in the spring of 2007, we have cruised south down the coast of the US, into Mexico, through Central America and Panama, and in 2009, we crossed into the Caribbean Sea via the Panama Canal. From there, we cruised north through the Caribbean side of Central America and the western Caribbean Islands, and arrived in Florida in late 2010 and in time for a Selene Rendezvous in the Bahamas the following spring! We left Florida and the Bahamas in the fall of 2011, and cruised through the Eastern Caribbean island chain, and via the ABC's and Columbia, completing our Caribbean circumnavigation in the fall of 2012. In the early months of 2013, we came back through the Panama Canal and into our home ocean, with the goal of crossing the breadth of the Pacific Ocean. We left Panama and sailed across via the Galapagos Islands, and the Marquesas, Tuamotu, and Society Islands of French Polynesia. From the Societies, we traveled to Suwarrow in the Cook Islands, Niue, and Tonga, and ended up in New Zealand at the end of 2013. After cyclone season was over in 2014, we cruised to Fiji and spent the entire season there, cruising amongst the many islands, and returned to New Zealand to spend another cyclone season. In 2015, we moved onward to Vanuatu and New Caledonia, and finally finished our Pacific crossing, arriving in Australia this past October. Currently, we are spending this cyclone season in New South Wales and are traveling inland in Australia to see the many sights and critters here.

Thus far, we have put 5400 hours on our engine, 7300 hours on our generator (we mostly anchor out), and 3500 hours on our water maker! In our travels, we have covered 38,000 nautical miles in our wonderful Selene! Wow.....It hardly seems possible, and we still have many more miles to go yet!


Our future cruising plans have us heading off to Indonesia, Malaysia, and Thailand in July of this year. Our long term goals have us heading north into Asia and around via the Aleutians and back to where we started from, Alaska and the Pacific Northwest, but there are many more adventures yet to be had. 






e are John and Priscilla Provencher and our home port is New London, CT. We became boaters over 40 years ago when Priscilla gave me a shiny new Sunfish when I graduated from college. Over the many years since, we have mostly been sailors-working our way up from day sailors, to pocket cruisers, then to a solid 38 footer, which we sailed throughout the northeast coastal waters. As we neared retirement we knew that boating would become even more important in our lives, so in 2004 we started searching for a comfortable and capable cruiser. After a year of crawling over, around and through a countless number of sail and power boats we found exactly what we were looking for at The Newport Boat Show. The moment we stepped on board that Selene, we knew our search was over. This boat had everything we wanted. It combined the best features of everything we had seen. Within a week we had a contract signed and we knew that 36-09 would be ours in the spring of 2005. Sitzmark III was commissioned in May of 2005 just in time for the Selene East Coast rendezvous held in Portsmouth RI. (As an aside, Sitzmark is the German word for the impression you make when you fall backwards in the snow, it is also the name of the apres ski bar where I met Priscilla.) Since casting off the lines for the first time leaving Portsmouth, RI we have cruised from Canada to The Bahamas and attended rendezvous in Rhode Island ('05), Florida ('09) and The Bahamas ('11). We now have 11 boating seasons in the log book and have traveled over 10,000 nm. Our Selene has provided us with many wonderful memories and great boating friends in the Selene community.

7 e are Mark & Roseanne Tilden, proud owners of "Koinonia", a Selene 60, and former owners of a Selene 50, also named "Koinonia". We are (or at least I, Mark, am) a life-long boater, having grown up the son of a US Coast Guardsman, and holding a 100-ton master's license myself.

For the first 25 years of my boating career, I was a racing sailor. Roseanne was extremely patient with my sailing habit. Twice, she flew to Hawaii to meet me at the end of the Pacific Cup race from San Francisco to Kaneohe. She drove innumerable times up and down the West Coast of the US either taking me to, or picking me up from, sailboat races.

We would often cruise our sailboats in Puget Sound and the San Juan Islands between races, but a week aboard the sailboat was just about all Roseanne could tolerate (especially since our two daughters were both pretty young at the time).

25 years and five racing sailboats later, at the end of the 2002 Pacific Cup, we decided it might be time to try a switch to power. We looked at several boats, and had even begun the process of buying a Krogen North Sea 48 when we saw our first Selene at the January 2003 Seattle Boat Show. I called Roseanne and said "you have to come see this boat." She came back to the show the next day with me and said "I would go with you on this boat!". A short time later, we placed an order for a Selene 50 (we chose a 50 because of dock space limitations).

Our first Selene was delivered in August of 2004, and in the summer of 2005 we joined a small group of other Selene owners to circumnavigate Vancouver Island, off the west coast of British Columbia, Canada. We spent 8 weeks aboard with these new friends (this is where we got to know our dear friends, John & Kathy Youngblood and their Selene 53 "Mystic Moon"), and Roseanne loved the whole experience! In fact, the notion that we might upgrade to a Selene 59/60 was born on this trip!.

Niel & Nancy Davidson owners of Three Wishes



Patrick & Miriam Gill owners of Spirit





About Us...


n 1986 we sat on a boat ramp in Phoenix, Arizona with our four year old son and decided we wanted to become sailors. We were hoping to find a summer sport to complement our winter skiing. Sam took sailing lessons the next spring and we purchased our first sailboat, a Catalina 22 we dubbed **OdesSea**. Sailing in Arizona during the summer is akin to walking over hot coals. That summer we sailed from Long Beach, California to Catalina Island and immediately realized we needed a bigger boat. The following year we purchase our first **Foreign Affair**, a Catalina 25 and spent the next seven years sailing the lakes of Arizona and Nevada, the Sea of Cortez, Catalina Island, the coast southern California and into Mexico.

Over the course of the next twenty-seven years, we owned two more Foreign Affairs. From 2000 to 2001 we sailed our Catalina 30 in and around Hilton Head Island and Savannah, and when we moved to New England in 2001 we had her trucked up.
